3. Profile of skills and competences

The skilled fisherman has shown competence in planning and carrying out fishing and hunting from large and medium-sized fishing vessels, using active and passive tools for fishing and hunting in different types of waters. The fisherman is able to use fishing and hunting tools and carry out daily maintenance on these, including deck machinery, the engine and the boat. He or she understands the conditions that might influence a boat's stability, is able to read charts and navigate safely and exercise good seamanship. The fisherman is able to use navigation instruments and maritime radio. The fisherman has shown competence in assessing sustainable and controlled use of resources, economic benefits and profitability for the fishing trade. The fisherman is able to work in line with current rules and regulations, and is able to assess and handle raw materials and transfer seafood based on current requirements for quality and market demands. The fisherman is able to assess risk, comply with requirements for safety at sea, and comply with rules for Environment, Health and Safety.

This comprises a total of 588 hours in Common core subjects, 954 hours in Common programme subjects, 421 hours vocational specialization. This is followed by two years of training in a company, where one year is training and one year is productive work. Adult students may in some cases be exempted from the requirement for the common core subjects.</p>
