The holder of this document has the competence to prevent, normalize and treat skin ailments on the basis of the needs of various customers. S/he

- masters various methods of special treatment of skin, nails and body care, and is qualified to use and maintain relevant machines and technical aids
- is familiar with product ingredients, their effects and chemical and functional properties
- has knowledge about skin structure and function, as well as the most common skin ailments and skin diseases and is qualified to guide the customer
- is qualified to observe other illnesses that can be recognized by changes to skin, hair and nails
- has knowledge of colour theory and skills in day and special makeup
- is able to carry out this work in a proper manner bearing in mind health, safety and the environment

The final training comprises the modules 1: Environmental studies, 2: Dermatology and diseases, 3: Business economy studies, 4: Makeup and colour theory, 5: Skin care, 6: Customer treatment, 7: Machines, products and environmental studies.

The holder of this document also has skills on the upper secondary school level in Norwegian, English, mathematics, natural science, social studies and physical education. Adult students may in some cases be exempted from the requirement for these common-core general studies subjects.

Grade 6 is the best grade. Grades 2 - 6 are passing grades. Subjects with both examination grades and overall achievement grades have been passed when the examination grade is 2 or better. "Exempted" may be used instead of numeral grades in some subjects. This means that the pupil/external candidate has previously passed corresponding or more comprehensive training in the subject. Adults may also have their attained competence assessed instead of receiving a numeral grade. The assessment "Approved" equals a passing grade.</p>
